

### Searching NUCat for Books on Global Journalism

Neither “Global Journalism” nor “Journalism—Global” are valid Library of Congress Subject Headings. Below is a list of some suggested subject headings starting from broad to narrow that can be used in either the Search or Guided Search functions of the Northwestern University Library Catalog. **All of the Subject Headings listed below may be subdivided geographically.**

**COMMUNICATION**—This is a very broad subject. It includes works on human communication, including both the primary techniques of language, pictures, etc., and the secondary techniques, such as the press and radio. Works on the modern means of mass communication are entered under **Mass Media**. Works on the communications industries treated collectively are entered under **Communication and Traffic**.

**JOURNALISM**. This term can be subdivided either geographically or with other Library of Congress Subject Heading Subdivisions. For example:

**Journalism—Brazil**  
**Journalism—Political aspects**

**PRESS**. Use “–Press Coverage” as a subdivision after geographic terms, individual corporate bodies and under classes of persons, ethnic groups, individual events, and topical headings. For example:

**Germany—Press Coverage**

Additional Narrower Terms for **PRESS**:

**PRESS AND POLITICS**  
**GOVERNMENT AND THE PRESS**

**FOREIGN NEWS**—Here are entered works on journalistic practices in reporting news about foreign events. When the heading is subdivided by place, the subdivision refers to the locality where the news is released.

**BROADCAST JOURNALISM**—Includes radio and television news. Narrower Terms:

**Radio Journalism**  
**Television Broadcasting of News**

**NEWSPAPERS**—This term may be subdivided geographically or with other subject or form subdivisions. For example:

**Newspapers—Circulation**  
**Newspapers—Directories**

**PERIODICALS**—A publication issued at stated, more or less regular, intervals

**PHOTOJOURNALISM**— Here are entered works on the photographic presentation of news stories, with written material frequently subordinate to the pictorial elements. Works on various visual elements, such as graphs, drawings, or photographs, used as supplementary material to written news stories are entered under **Journalism—Pictorial**.
